Operations

Hours and Services Status

All locations experienced normal operations during August without the need for adjustments to hours or services for any reason.

Library Tours

Fairwell to the First Floor

On Tuesday, August 27th Mayor Lauren McLean and Brian Klene attended the "<u>Fairwell to the First Floor</u>" community party to acknowledge the current configuration and to prep for upcoming construction. Activities included creating a one-year time capsule, iron-on decals featuring images from the story well mural, and the opportunity to write on the walls.



Upcoming Opportunity for the Library Board of Trustees

The Library Board is invited to attend the Boise Public Library In-Service Day (*Best In-Service Day Ever, Vol. II: Gather and Grow*) on Monday, October 13th at the Shrine Social Club. With a theme of "Growing Boise Citizens", we will focus on relationship building, futures thinking, and social engagement.

Library staff will begin arriving at 8am to check in, grab a light breakfast and mingle. At 8:30, our day will begin with a welcome and move into interactive sessions, community partner roundtable lunch, a keynote speaker at 1:15pm, and activities designed to connect teams across the system.

There are opportunities for trustees to engage throughout the day, including help to welcome and check in staff at the beginning of the day or joining a community partner at a lunch table for conversations. We will share with you a copy of our interactive program guide closer to the event.

Project Summary	 <u>Downtown Library</u> numerous major repair and maintenance items that need to be addressed to give the library another 20+ years of life, along with space reconfigurations to better serve the public. This work will consist of a program of projects to occur over several years based on project prioritization and budget. <u>Cole & Ustick Library</u> new book auto sorter and tenant improvements. <u>Library Facilities Master Planning</u> to address facilities needs for the next 20 years which will be utilized to aid in future decisions about location, size, design and functions of library facilities as well as to better understand staffing needs and potential funding options.

Brick repairs/ Window Replacements

✓ Project Scope: Repair exterior cracks in mortar & window replacement for 2nd – 4th floors.

Status:

- Out to bid in early spring '26.
- Work is tentatively planned to begin Spring 2026, pending budget is aligned with bidding climate.

Elevator Upgrades – 4 story

✓ Project Scope: Upgrade elevator in 4 story with an MRL traction system. This will remove the hydraulic mechanics and replace car completely to have a better overall performance and eliminate the risk of down time due to unexpected underground leaks. There is anticipated energy savings with this type of installation.

Status:

- Elevator report was completed in 2022 with recommendations for elevator improvements over the next 4-7 years.
- Design has begun. Permit submission slated for mid-summer 2025 with bidding to start Fall 2025 to accommodate the lead times for elevators and align construction with 1st floor closure.

COLE & USTICK AUTOSORTER UPDATE

Scope: Installation of new book auto sorter and tenant improvements to accommodate new auto sorter and staff model update and associated furniture needs.

Status:

- AutoSorter delivery and installation is scheduled for end of September 2025.
- Tenant improvements underway, set to be finished end of September.

LIBRARY FACILITIES PLANNING UPDATE

Scope: Assess space utilization, develop and implement a community engagement process to ensure alignment with strategic planning goals and the community, develop recommendations/ alternatives to close the gap with cost estimates, develop various models for new facilities including recommended approach and locations, sizes, and types which includes options for phasing and preparing a 20-year implementation schedule.

Status:

• Facility Plan is under review by the Board with final review with Board anticipated at September Board meeting. Facility Plan will be in front of Council in October.

Overall Project Health	Summary: Downtown Library: 1st floor renovations with deferred maintenance items are anticipated to be completed by fall of 2026. Major parking lot replacement construction is estimated to begin in fiscal year 2027 when funding is available. Cole & Ustick Library: On budget, schedule of delivery has aligned better with construction which is anticipated in fall of 2025.
	Library Master Facilities Planning: On budget & schedule
Highlights	Downtown Library : Estimated construction start for early fall. Move preparations are underway. Facility Master Plan has been shared with City Council, Library Board of Trustees, and public.



Scope	Public Works is continuing to review the program of projects to determine proper prioritization based on the information provided in the condition assessment report, efficiencies, and budget.
Budget	The budget will continue to be monitored as we receive estimates and bids to determine the work that can be completed this fiscal year. We have City contingency set aside for each project to ensure we have funding for any potential change orders during construction.
Schedule	Any project specific schedule delays will be noted in the bid package updates section.
Risks	Construction market challenges, including finding multiple bidders and pricing. 1st floor renovation project will include deferred maintenance and full electrical replacement for the building. Electricians are in high demand with large scale projects under construction in the valley. Pending tariffs could cause spikes in construction costs.









Active Cardholders




Cardholders by Month FY25






Physical Circulation

Physical Circ by Location FYTD25






Digital Circulation by Format FY '25



Digital Audiences by Month - FY25














Physical Circulation Historic





Question Type by Location FY25




Question Type by Day of Week FY25



BYLAWS BOISE PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

ARTICLE I LEGAL BASIS

The Board of Trustees of the Boise Public Library exists by virtue of the provisions of Idaho law, including Title 33, Chapter 26 of the Idaho Code. Boise City Code Title 2, Chapter 7 further governs and defines the powers, duties and operation of the Board. The Board exercises the powers and authority and assumes the responsibilities and duties delegated to it under the laws of the state of Idaho and Boise City Code for the provision of public library service in Boise City. In addition to the powers, duties and purposes stated therein, the Board may exercise such other powers, not inconsistent with law, necessary for the orderly and efficient management of the Library.

ARTICLE II TRUSTEE SELECTION AND APPOINTMENT

Section 1. Number of Trustees

A Board of five Library Trustees, selected from the residents of Boise City, shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council. The Board favors the established custom of the inclusion of one non-voting member of the City Council who will attend board meetings and act as liaison for the Board and City Government.

Section 2. Term of Office

A term of office shall be for five years; the term of one Trustee shall expire each year on June 30th. Appointments to complete an unexpired term shall be for the remainder of the unexpired term only. Trustees shall hold their office from appointment until the term expiration and until successors are appointed, unless disqualified from office. In accordance with City policy, Trustees shall serve no more than two terms or more than ten consecutive years.

By accepting appointment to the Board, Trustees agree to attend, in-person or virtually, a minimum of three-fourths of the regularly-scheduled meetings annually. Unless excused by the President, missing three consecutive regular meetings, for other than health-related reasons, is considered a resignation from the Board.

Section 3. Salary

All Trustees, officers included, shall serve without salary or any compensation, except that they may receive actual and necessary expenses when engaged in the business of the Library.

Section 4. Vacancies

All Trustee resignations shall be reported to the Mayor and City Council by the Board, with a request that the vacancy be advertised. The process for filling a vacancy will be prescribed by the Mayor's office. In the event a Trustee relocates the Trustee's residence outside the City of Boise, this shall be deemed a resignation and a vacancy shall be created.

Section 5. Removal

Removal shall be as provided in Idaho statutes and Boise City Code.

ARTICLE III POWERS AND DUTIES

Section 1. Powers and Duties

The powers and duties of the Board of Trustees shall be as set forth in Title 33, Chapter 26 of the Idaho Code and Boise City Code Title 2, Chapter 7. In addition to the powers, duties and purposes stated therein, the Board may exercise such other powers, not inconsistent with law, necessary for the orderly and efficient management of the Library.

Section 2. Policies

The Board shall act as the policy making body of the Boise Public Library in compliance with all statutes of the State of Idaho and Boise City Code relating to the operation of public libraries and shall develop and maintain, with advice of the Library Director and staff, policies for the Library and rules governing use of the Library with the highest possible degree of operating efficiency in the Library, consistent with the Library's mission and strategic vision. The Board shall have the power as necessary to determine any question of policy.

Section 3. Budget

The Board shall prepare and adopt an annual budget for review and approval by the City Council for the ensuing fiscal year, with the advice and assistance of the Library Director, allocating the proper amounts for materials, salaries, maintenance, and other operating and capital expenses necessary for the orderly and efficient management of the Library. The Board may also approve interim budget recommendations for submission to City Council.

Section 3. Expenditures

The Board shall have control of the expenditures of all moneys collected for the Library Fund.

Section 4. Property

The Board shall have the supervision, care, and custody of any room or building constructed, leased, or set apart for Library purposes, and it may, with the approval of the Council, lease and occupy or purchase or erect on purchased ground any appropriate building. The Board shall take charge of the public Library, reading rooms, and its branches, and of all real and personal property belonging to it, or what may be acquired by loan, purchase, gift, devise, or otherwise, when not inconsistent with the terms and conditions of the gift, devise, or bequest. The Board shall have the power to make and enforce all rules, regulations, and bylaws necessary to administer, govern, and protect the Library, reading rooms, and branches, and all property belonging or loaned to it.

Section 5. Appointments

The Board of Trustees shall appoint a Library Director, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Board. The Library Director's duties shall be those prescribed by state law, city policy, together with such other such others duties requested by the Board that are reasonably required for proper operation of the Library.

Section 6. Gifts and Trusts

The Board shall receive and administer any trust or any other fund declared or created by gift or otherwise for the Library and branches.

Section 7. Reports

The Board of Trustees shall annually, not later than the first day of January, file with the board of library commissioners a report of the operations of the Library for the fiscal year just ended. The report shall be of such form and contain such information as the board of library commissioners may require.

Section 8. Other Duties

Additional duties of the Board shall include, but not necessarily be limited to the following: promote the Library and its services to the public; obtain adequate funds for Library operation; developing a program of planned growth and improvement of the Library facilities and Library services; work cooperatively with supporting organizations to promote the Library, provide information to the public regarding the Library and with regard to Library support and improvements; work cooperatively with other public officials and boards and support legislation that benefits Library users; and cooperate with public officials to maintain positive public relations; seek to maintain positive public relations and provide information to the public.

ARTICLE IV OFFICERS

Section 1. Election

The Board shall elect at its annual meeting from its members a President and Vice President who shall serve for a term of one (1) year or until his/her successor is elected. In the event of a vacancy, the Board may elect an officer to succeed the vacant position prior to and until the next annual meeting election.

Section 2. Duties

A. President

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board, authorize calls for special meetings, regulate and control public participation, appoint all committees, execute documents authorized by the Board, serve as ex-officio member of all committees, ensure that a true and accurate record is maintained of all meetings of the Board, plan the meeting agenda with the Director and staff, and perform all other duties associated with that office.

B. Vice President

In the absence of the President, the Vice President shall preside and perform all duties associated with the President's office.

Section 3. Vacancies

Vacancies occurring in any office shall be filled by majority vote of those Trustees present at the next regular meeting of the Board.

Section 4. Removal from Office

Any officer may be removed from office by the Board whenever, in the judgment of the Board, the best interests of the Library shall be served by such removal. In the event an officer becomes disqualified from serving as a Trustee (for example, the officer ceases to be a resident of the City of Boise), the officer shall be deemed removed and a vacancy shall be created.

ARTICLE V MEETINGS

Section 1. Frequency

The Board shall meet for business purposes monthly, except as shall be determined in advance by the Board at a regular meeting. The Board shall hold its annual meeting each year in September for the purposes set forth in Idaho Code Section 33-2606, as may be amended from time to time, including election of officers and establishment of meeting dates for the upcoming fiscal year.

Section 2. Special Meetings

Special meetings may be called by the President, or upon written request of three Trustees, for the transaction of business stated in the Notice of Special Meeting. Only that business so specified may be acted upon at the Special Meeting. Notification procedures shall comply with Idaho Code and Boise City policies.

Section 3. Quorum

A quorum shall consist of three (3) Trustees, but a smaller number may adjourn a meeting.

Section 4. Voting

Each Trustee has one vote. The Director is a non-voting attendee of Board meetings. An affirmative vote by the majority of Trustees present shall be necessary to approve any action of the Board. The President may introduce, vote upon, move, or second a proposal before the Board.

Section 5. Meeting Records

Records of meetings shall be maintained by the Library Director or the Director's designee.

ARTICLE VI PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The parliamentary authority shall be Roberts Rules of Order, current edition, except as stated in these Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Board with a quorum present, by majority vote of the Trustees present. Proposed amendments shall be distributed to Trustees at least two weeks prior to said meeting.



The Group4 analysis fundamentally misrepresents library access equity in our city by using flawed methodology that shows where people currently go, not where gaps in service exist. This is equivalent to saying we don't need new grocery stores because people are already shopping somewhere—it ignores the burden placed on underserved communities who must travel excessive distances for basic city services.

The data speaks clearly: West Boise residents collectively travel over 80,000 miles annually to access library services, compared to just 6,000 miles for the next most underserved area. This represents a massive inequity in city services that contradicts Boise's stated vision of being "a city for everyone." Libraries are not just about books—they provide essential community gathering spaces, free technology access, and educational programming that strengthens neighborhoods. No part of our city should be without reasonable access to these fundamental services.

Accepting this facilities plan locks West Boise out of equitable library access for the next 25+ years, as the next review won't occur until around 2050. While I support improvements to Hillcrest and Collister libraries, the highest priority should be providing service where it's completely missing rather than upgrading areas that already have access. Dear Boise Public Library Board of Trustees,

I was born and have lived in West Boise for 30+ years and have always been an avid reader and library goer. I currently live right next to Lowell Scott Middle School, and I grew up living right next to Centennial High School. When I was growing up, my parents made sure to make special trips to the Bookmobile and to other library branches because of my love of reading, even though they were often 15-20 minutes out of the way for us.

Children who attend schools in West Boise have to travel 4 miles to the closest library (Orchard Park), which isn't even in the Boise Public Library system. The closest Boise Public library is at Cole and Ustick, which is 5 miles away. While this may translate to only 15 minutes of drive time, it means an hour and a half walk down busy streets and highways for those without access to cars. A quick trip to the library after school for a child without a driver's license risks walking for an hour down Chinden Road to Orchard Park or almost 2 hours to the Cole and Ustick Branch.

The location analysis that was done for the recent facilities plan has a key flaw in the logic used. The findings were that citizens from all over the city use libraries, so therefore, no new library is needed. However, libraries provide critical services such as educational programs and free technology, so even people who don't have easy access to a library will go out of their way to get to one. Consider a grocery drought analysis. Groceries provide access to food, a critical need for living. So even those without easy access will make an effort to get to a grocery store because they need the products the grocery store provides.

The current libraries are wonderful and I truly appreciate all the amazing work they do. But I would like to request that the BPL Board reconsider the decision to not build a library to serve the citizens of West Boise. Please don't make us wait yet another generation for a library.

Dear Boise Public Library Board of Trustees,

I have been following the efforts to get a library added to west Boise, and was extremely disappointed to hear that an August 13th, the board drafted a plan that said no library was needed for the next 20-25 years. My understanding of the decision, was that it was based on data saying that the existing libraries receive traffic from all over the city. Unfortunately, I think there is a major flaw in the logic used.

Let me use a metaphor. If I have three cups placed out in the rain, each cup will catch some water. If I add funnels larger than the cups, more water will be collected in each. In this metaphor, the cups are libraries and the funnels are the extra distances people are willing to travel to get to the libraries. The logic used in the August 13th decision says, "look, all of the cups catch water". However, does this mean that the ground in the gaps between the cups isn't wet? Also, if the funnels were not there, even more rain would be missed. The use of the existing libraries doesn't accurately represent the need for a new library. There are people and children who are falling through the gaps because they can't or won't travel. Every missed droplet is a shame. Ideally, the cups would be so dense as to catch most all of the water without the need for funnels. There would be enough libraries so that no extensive travel would be required.


A far better way to measure the necessity of a library is by comparing the population density against the distance to the nearest library. I started looking into doing this analysis myself, then realized it was already done on this page https://www.citizensforalibrary.org/west-boise/areas-with-poor-access/. That analysis clearly shows that there is a need in west Boise for a library so that we can drastically reduce the distance any person needs to travel to get to a library.

I have also included the image I generated from the 2021 census data. I have outlined an the area that is clearly not covered by any libraries. I encourage the board to explore the 2021 census data here https://data.census.gov/map/050XX00US16001,16001\$1400000/ACSDT5YSPT2021/B01003?t=001 :Population+Total&y=2021&layer=VT_2021_140_00_PY_D1&loc=43.6925,-116.3321,z9.3543.

I believe libraries are particularly important for children who are still in school. Libraries not only provide places to study and congregate, but I have seen how libraries can be a refuge for children that come from broken homes. Libraries provide a safe environment for these children to complete their school work and pursue hobbies without being surrounded by the issues at home. These children often don't have access to the transportation required to get to a far away library. Restricting access to such a vital resource is unconscionable.

I implore the board to reconsider the data they are using to make their decision. Make sure what the data is saying truly represents the problem being addressed. Please don't measure how far people are currently willing to travel; instead measure how far people should be required to travel.

There still aren't any libraries very close to us. I was and still am grateful that I can pick up items at the Meridian, Garden City, and Ada Libraries. This limits how often we can use the library and deprives my children of a cornerstone of civic life.

Boise has a vision of being "a city for everyone." A facilities plan that leaves out one of the largest and most populated parts of the city does not reflect that vision. I respectfully urge you to reject the current draft facilities plan and require that it be revised to include a new library in West Boise. Our community deserves equitable access to this essential city service.

Thank you for your leadership and for considering the needs of families like mine. I hope you will ensure that all Boise residents—including those in West Boise—have the opportunity to benefit fully from our public library system.

I am so dismayed, disappointed and actually shocked about your decision to ignore the far NW area of Boise that does not have easy access to a local library. For you to decide that our area doesn't deserve your attention while you plan to improve or build new libraries in places that that already exist is demeaning.

I attended your community meeting at the Cole and Ustick branch and was very unhappy with the presentation. The person doing the meeting was not prepared at all for taking input from people attending that wanted a new library in a different location. Most of the attendees at this location were there because there wasn't a presentation in our area of the city. We weren't there because we are satisfied or unsatisfied with the Cole and Ustick location. Of course, it is a very good library and it is where I usually go, but I don't go there because it is convenient, I go there because it is the least out of the way location to my home near McMillan and Eagle Rd.

Most of the time at that meeting was taken up by a library employee (I don't remember the name or position) talking about the existing libraries. Then time consuming chat groups and charts were filled out per instructions that for us to mostly give our opinion on existing libraries.

As the meeting time was expiring without the presenter asking for attendees input and why we were at the meeting, a few of us interrupted to say we wanted a library in our neighborhood. Several of us did write that request on charts that were being filled out. It was obvious that the presenter or planners were not prepared to receive or consider a NW Boise location even though residents have been attending various meetings for the past year in an attempt to get a local library.

I felt ignored (or just tolerated) at the time because a new library wasn't on the agenda or consideration.

Your chart/map that shows NW Boise residents use other libraries doesn't give you any information other than we drive to existing libraries because we have NO other option. Is there a reason why we don't deserve equal consideration, or that it is okay for us to be paying taxes for less neighborhood services than other areas of Boise?

My feelings at the time of the meeting seem to be correct because it was decided that no new library coverage would be considered probably for 20-25 years. I will be dead by that time. Any current children in NW Boise will be grown and probably living elsewhere by then. Can you see how unfair it is to spend money to improve existing locations at the expense of residents that have no local option? And to let that status quo stand for another whole generation!

From my home, there is no good way to get to Cole and Ustick library without driving. It is a 5 mile walk to the Cole/Ustick location from my location. There is no reasonable way to get there by bus, and riding a bike on Ustick is not safe for me or any children.

This NW area of Boise is ignored in many ways. For instance: local media will describe something in 'west' Boise when talking about 19th to 23rd Streets; Community Education Classes and City Kid Activities are seldom if ever scheduled in our area; and the obvious absence of a library. We pay our share of taxes but do not get our share of local services.

Please reconsider creating a library for NW Boise in the near future.

Dear Boise Public Library Board of Trustees,

My name is Mark Salisbury. I have been a resident of Boise since 2002. Not long after I moved here, I saw Boise improve its library system to become a library system with branch libraries, bringing libraries closer to where people live. I have lived in the same area of Boise – West Boise, close to Eagle Road and McMillan, since I moved here. I love the schools that are nearby. There are also a few parks close by that we frequently enjoy too.


You know where I'm going next: there isn't a library close by. That's why I reached out to city council member Luci Willits in early 2022 to ask, can we do anything about this? I attended city meetings in 2022, and in 2023 I started a group, called Citizens for a Library in West Boise. Together we ran a petition to see if there was support in the community to petition for a library. The response impressed me. Nearly everyone we spoke with was supportive, willing to sign the petition, particularly when they viewed a map showing the placement of Boise and adjacent libraries. When we presented our petition to the City Council and Library Director Dorr, we were told that no decision would be made regarding a library branch in West Boise at that time, but instead a library facilities study would be conducted.

We've closely watched, and participated in, the facility study when opportunities for public feedback have been available. From the beginning, these studies have hinted that the library staff have been biased against the notion of a new library branch. The format of the questions and discussions has essentially been two questions: "what do you like about your library branch?", "what would you like to see done differently?".


Now that the draft plan of the facilities study has been made public through the monthly <u>Board of Trustees meeting on August 13th</u>, we've learned definitively that no, the plan for library facilities in Boise for the next 20 years is only to improve existing locations. I do appreciate the questions that were raised at that meeting in recognition of our requests and participation.

As the topic was raised again during the meeting about the request for a library branch in West Boise and the data, the response was that: we're not telling you that you can't build another library branch. It's wonderful if you do, but it would cost additional money. (Of course it would! It think it's a very manageable amount however.) However, based on our property tax assessment, we all pay equally to fund the city, even areas without good library coverage. This rejection, after years of engagement, and data that shows the clear need, really feels like Boise is saying: Boise *is* a city for everyone, as long as you don't live in West Boise.

This map I've created is different from ones I've shared previously that show a two-mile radius around each library. Instead, this simply shows boundary lines identifying the closest library:



I propose that in the next 20-year library facilities plan, we complete the library branch coverage idea initiated by the previous facilities plan 25 years ago. If a library branch were located along Cloverdale, between McMillan and Ustick, I believe it would provide optimal coverage of our underserved area. I would propose to call this the "Cloverdale" branch.

The facilities plan had three different options, A, B, and C, with different trade-offs for timing, and C maximizing community engagement by announcing improvements at all locations at the same time.

I propose an option D that works like this:

3 new library facilities will be added: Cloverdale, Collister, and Hillcrest. Collister and Hillcrest, currently leased space, will be replaced by standalone facilities. Small updates will be made to Cole & Ustick and Bown Crossing, with updates being planned for the main library farther out.

Steps to execute plan D:

- 1. Obtain approval from City Council for a library facilities plan that includes additional staff for one new library branch, when that facility comes online.
- 2. Locations are identified in the right locations and land is acquired ASAP, using city capital funds.
 - a. It's important to acquire the land ASAP to proceed with the remaining steps in the plan, and because options are becoming scarcer and scarcer, at least that's what I've observed in my part of town.
 - b. I know there will be a battle to spend any capital funds, they are in demand for many project ideas!
- 3. With locations in hand and a vision for what the new buildings will be, work with the non-profits who support the library system, the Boise Public Library Foundation and Friends of the

Boise Public Library, to raise private money to help write the next chapter in the Boise Library System.

- 4. With a movement already underway to revitalize and enhance the branch library system, go to the voters for approval for a levy to fund the construction of the facilities. The message should include that private donations are helping to lower the cost of the new facilities but cannot completely cover the cost. (What this mix will be we will have to see when we get closer to that time how much money can be raised through private contributions).
- 5. If the levy passes, bids go out and construction begins as soon as possible.
- 6. If the levy fails, I suspect that private contributions might be returned to donors, as they were in 2019 when the new main library project failed. Also, with the land in hand, it's not that the projects will never happen, but they will be delayed. We can't predict the future economy or even the future political climate that may be more (hopefully) supportive of education and investment in libraries.

Additionally, because we don't know if a levy will pass and when we might begin construction on new facilities, I would urge that we also look for a leased space option for West Boise. This space could likely be found in the Boise Research Center. I do not believe this is a good long term location; while it would be closer to where I live I do not think it would (a) be as visible as a location directly along Cloverdale Road and (b) be located well, like the proposed Cloverdale branch is in the map above, serving both citizens in the Centennial Neighborhood Association and West Valley Neighborhood association, which cover the west most side of Boise.

As members of the Library Board of Trustees, I urge you to request that the plan be amended to include a new library branch for West Boise also. If a library branch is included in the new facilities plan, I will support efforts, including a possible levy, to realize the plan.

On the other hand, if the plan continues as proposed currently, I would not be supportive of a future library levy. It would feel too much to me like 2018 - 2019, where a library project was planned that was not in sync with the community.

Dear Boise Library Board of Trustees,

I'm writing to request that you reject the new library facilities plan until it has a plan for a facility in West Boise included.

When I moved to Boise almost 20 years ago, I was impressed and excited by the library facilities and the agreements between the cities, making it easy to visit any library branch and share between all collections to expand the ability to check out materials. As I had children, we started to travel to the library to participate in children's programs as well. I have seen programs for children, teens, adults and seniors advertised as well. Informative classes on taxes or technology are often offered.

The last facilities plan was a brilliant move to create smaller satellite branches that could bring access closer to the residents of Boise, while keeping the larger downtown branch to house a more robust collection and the space to offer services a smaller branch may not be able to offer.

From what I heard in the meeting discussing the proposed facilities plan, the current vision is to make every branch as large as possible, and not really improve access for any residents. I don't understand why our newest branches are now determined to be insufficient in their size. Was this poor design when they were built? I believe Group4 did not sufficiently understand the original vision.

I am a resident of Boise, but live west of Eagle Road. It takes 15 minutes to drive to the closest Boise branch (Cole & Ustick) at a good traffic time and I can count on one hand the amount of times I have gone there. The library branches in other cities that I actually frequent take nearly as long. It takes 20 minutes to drive to the downtown branch. Group4 never analyzed that. They never asked if citizens are happy with the amount of time it takes to get to a library, or if it is possible to bike or walk to a library. There should be a library significantly closer to my house to provide equitable access across the city. The answer "people are finding there way to libraries" is a poor excuse to ignore my neighborhood.

I understand that the library has limited funds, but I have a hard time believing that areas that have a close branch are in more need of an upgrade (and in the case of Collister and Hillcrest, a new building) than the West Boise residents are in need of something, anything, which we have been begging the city to consider for over two years.

Please demand that West Boise be included in the new facilities plan. In 20 more years we will have lost our opportunity to create another amazing satellite branch to serve almost 30,000 citizens who would love to have a library as close as other Boise citizens.

My name is Larry Ice and I've lived in Far West Boise 83713 since 2009. I am a supporter of libraries and open access to all materials.

First, I fully and sincerely appreciate your service to Boise and to the Boise Library Department. I hope the Trustees and the library department realize that Mark Salisbury and Citizens for a Library are also volunteers working with the best interests of Boise and the Boise Library system at heart.

I am respectfully writing to encourage the Boise Library Board of Trustees to withhold approval of Group 4's strategic facilities plan in the current form because, while I believe the report has some value, I also believe it to be incomplete, faulty and irrelevant to the current and future situation in Boise for several reasons.

- First and most important, libraries have intrinsic value far beyond lending books, media and computer access. They provide a myriad of other services, many for our most vulnerable residents. Physical libraries become city meeting spaces, the cornerstone of neighborhoods, the fabric of communities, the common ground and experiences that work to blend age, cultural, ethnic, economic and educational differences. They create a city for everyone where all are welcome. We recognize areas in our city by names such as Collister, Hillcrest and Bown Crossing. These libraries build a sense of belonging, inclusion and unity. There are no city facilities, especially libraries, in Far West Boise. Where can we anchor our sense of community? Even in city communications, they refer to areas like the West End, North West Boise, the West Bench and West Valley without actually referring to or thinking about those of us in Far West Boise. In city government, only District 1 contains no city facilities for our city councilmember to meet with her constituents, and the Centennial Neighborhood Association has no place to meet. None of the Library listening sessions were held in Far West Boise.
- West Boise has both natural and manmade boundaries that separate us from the city center
 and restrict mobility. We have very limited public transportation. Only Eagle Rd. and
 Glenwood cross the river. Garden City separates us from North West Boise. Only Chinden and
 184 connect us to the core of the city. While the Group 4 report may show we patronize Boise
 libraries outside our area, it doesn't show how often we do so, the efforts we must make or
 how often we go elsewhere.
- Finally, I am asking for this report to be amended and the trustees to reconsider a report that includes a Boise Library in Far West Boise because it's simply a no risk, no cost request that has no reason to be denied. The Boise Library Strategic Facilities Plan is not code nor

commitment. Inclusion in the plan does not mean a West Boise library will be realized, but exclusion in this report could be used in the future to stop any consideration without discussion or reason. We need a library in West Boise. Just add the words- Add a library in West Boise to fill the library desert. Ten to twenty years is a generation, way too long for an arbitrary 'NO' made now to hinder any effort in the future.

A rejection of any possibility of a Boise Library in Far West Boise is in opposition to values the City of Boise and the Boise Library system states in city documents.

Strategic Priorities (Strategic Framework for Impact) **Expand Access**

Make our collections, programs, and services available when, where, and how people want them. Ensure that every community member has access to library materials in a format that works for them. Create library spaces that are accessible and welcoming to all. Increase the number of people who are aware of and benefit from the variety of services the library provides. "Where" people need and want Boise Library services is Far West Boise. The stated Strategic Priority is to Create library spaces. "Create" implies new creation, not just making existing facilities bigger. Proximity has to be a factor in "accessible." No one feels "welcome" when their community is excluded. People do not "benefit" from services that are not accessible.

Increase Impact

Create valuable experiences for **every resident** and meet their needs at every stage of life.

Elevate literacy and lifelong learning for Boise residents. **Strengthen connections with community organizations.** "Every resident" should include those in Far West Boise. "Community organizations" should include Citizens for a Library, the Neighborhood Associations of Far West Boise and City Council District 1.

Optimize Resources

Modernize, strengthen, and streamline our operational capabilities. Modernize operations to serve the community more efficiently. Invest in a highly trained and well-supported workforce.

Measure Value

Establish impact and performance metrics and **use data for decision-making.** Measure and communicate the impact of the Library on the Boise community.

Collect, evaluate, and utilize community feedback. Citizens for a Library provided data that clearly documents the library desert and the distance barrier to equitable access. The Boise Library Department collected community feedback, then failed to honestly evaluate it. The raw survey responses were never made public and the summary provided acknowledged that 83713, Far West Boise, had a 3 fold increase per captia of survey responders to previous surveys, but the summary failed to let the public know what 83713 said, "We need a library in West Boise." The Group 4 report includes a chart showing that the residents of West Boise will drive into Boise Libraries, but it fails to show that we often drive to the libraries of neighboring cities. 58% of the Garden City Library patrons hold Boise library cards. At opening, over 10% of the new Meridian Orchard Park Library patrons held Boise library cards. What about Ada Community and Eagle? This information is readily available to the Boise Library Department but excluded from the report and evaluation. More? Which area in Boise has the least access to Valley Ride or pathways? More? The survey and listening sessions brought up parking issues at some current libraries. How do we reconcile asking the residents of Far West Boise to drive into libraries that may have parking challenges? Are these parking

challenges, especially at Cole and Ustick, because this library attracts drivers from Far West Boise. More? City Council District 1 has the lowest Boise library card rate in the city. Is it because we're illiterate or uninterested or could it be because Boise Libraries are simply too far way for convenient access or impact on the community? Did Group 4 even look into this disparity? More? The 2023 Library Report lists \$1,665,831.90 contributed in economic value to entrepreneurs and businesses in Boise without substantiation. How is this benefit measured and how would it grow with library access in Far West Boise?

The "Listening Sessions." (Strategic Framework for Impact)

"The Boise Public Library held listening sessions, attended various community events, interviewed individuals and organizations, offered visioning activities in our libraries, and conducted an online survey that had over 2300 responses. We focused on listening to the community to address questions like:"

- **Do our programs and services reflect our community's needs and wants?** Citizens for a Library and the residents of Far West Boise were very vocal about the need for and the desire for a Boise Library in Far West Boise.
- How can we create a welcoming environment for everyone? How can we create a "welcoming environment" when exclude a large portion of Boise's residents?
- Where can we make the biggest impact and set bold goals for the years ahead? The biggest impact for growing resident access would be a Boise Library in Far West Boise. A bold goal would be a Boise Library in Far West Boise rather than a timid goal of making existing branches "bigger."

Trustee Bios talk about "remain true to core values of open access, the library is an important part of the community, support equitable access to literacy and learning, ensure everyone in Boise can benefit from the Library, and strengthening the sense of community and equality among the residents of our city." We've heard similar sentiments from the city administration. Even Blueprint Boise, the vision for our city's future, has a library proximity goal of three miles that has added branches, but only on the east side of town. I suggest that many of these sentiments can best be honored by keeping an open mind and removing barriers to the idea of an expanding Boise Library system, including a library in Far West Boise.


I am writing to you regarding my concerns with the library facilities plan draft.

I have lived in the very north west corner of Boise (near Eagle and McMillan roads) for the past 16 years. As soon as I moved here I realized that we were missing an important community component nearby: A LIBRARY. In the NW corner of Boise we are significantly further from a library (Boise or other neighboring cities) than most of the rest of the city. I live 4 miles away from the closest library and 5 miles from a Boise library. Depending on traffic, it takes me 15-25 minutes to drive to a library.

I think it would be great if nearly all Boise citizens had a library within 2 miles. This would allow people to reasonably get to a library without having to have a car. There are many people (teenagers, refugees, etc) that don't have access to a car. They cannot drive to the library. Those that don't have cars are often those that would benefit most from the many resources libraries offer.

The analysis by Group 4 that says "libraries are well-distributed" is flawed. My biggest issue is that they seemed to say that library usage is even across the city, even in well populated areas. It is not. Looking at the data that they shared, the further you get away from a library the fewer people visit the library. I don't think that this is because people that live further from libraries don't value them, it is because it is harder for them to get to a library. We should be providing access to all areas of Boise.

This <u>link</u> shows an analysis of population density compared to distance from a library. It shows by far that the area of Boise most at a disadvantage for library ease of access is the far west edge of Boise.



Also, looking at the map that Group 4 shared showing all Boise and surrounding LYNX libraries clearly shows that there is not an even distribution of libraries. There is a large gap in the middle of the map.



The library's goals are:

- Ensure that every community member has access to library materials in a format that works for them.
- Create library spaces that are accessible and welcoming to all.
- Increase the number of people who are aware of and benefit from the variety of services the library provides.

I believe that one of the best ways to meet these goals is to have libraries that are geographically accessible to all of Boise. Everyone living in Boise pays equal taxes to support the library, everyone should have equitable benefit from that.

The west edge of Boise has shown you its desire to have a library in our area. We value and want all of the great things that having a library brings to a community. I ask you to NOT adopt the proposed facilities plan as it is. I ask you to look at the data (and maybe even ask for more data taking population density into consideration). I ask that you make all of Boise, especially the western side of Boise, included in having library access in the facilities plan. I urge you to make this change to the facilities plan before endorsing it and presenting it to City Council.

Dear Boise Public Library Board of Trustees,

I have been following the efforts to get a library added to west Boise, and was extremely disappointed to hear that an August 13th, the board drafted a plan that said no library was needed for the next 20-25 years. My understanding of the decision, was that it was based on data saying that the existing libraries receive traffic from all over the city. Unfortunately, I think there is a major flaw in the logic used.

Let me use a metaphor. If I have three cups placed out in the rain, each cup will catch some water. If I add funnels larger than the cups, more water will be collected in each. In

this metaphor, the cups are libraries and the funnels are the extra distances people are willing to travel to get to the libraries. The logic used in the August 13th decision says, "look, all of the cups catch water". However, does this mean that the ground in the gaps between the cups isn't wet? Also, if the funnels were not there, even more rain would be missed. The use of the existing libraries doesn't accurately represent the need for a new library. There are people and children who are falling through the gaps because they can't or won't travel. Every missed droplet is a shame. Ideally, the cups would be so dense as to catch most all of the water without the need for funnels. There would be enough libraries so that no extensive travel would be required.

A far better way to measure the necessity of a library is by comparing the population density against the distance to the nearest library. I started looking into doing this analysis myself, then realized it was already done on this page https://www.citizensforalibrary.org/west-boise/areas-with-poor-access/ That analysis clearly shows that there is a need in west Boise for a library so that we can drastically reduce the distance any person needs to travel to get to a library.

I have also included the image I generated from the 2021 census data. I have outlined an the area that is clearly not covered by any libraries. I encourage the board to explore the 2021 census data

I believe libraries are particularly important for children who are still in school. Libraries not only provide places to study and congregate, but I have seen how libraries can be a refuge for children that come from broken homes. Libraries provide a safe environment for these children to complete their school work and pursue hobbies without being surrounded by the issues at home. These children often don't have access to the transportation required to get to a far away library. Restricting access to such a vital resource is unconscionable.

I implore the board to reconsider the data they are using to make their decision. Make sure what the data is saying truly represents the problem being addressed. Please don't measure how far people are currently willing to travel; instead measure how far people should be required to travel.

Proposition 1: 2019 Ballot Wording

November 5, 2019 election

"AN INITIATIVE REQUIRING VOTER APPROVAL OF THE COST, FINANCING, LOCATION, DESIGN, AND SIZE OF CERTAIN BOISE CITY LIBRARY FACILITY PROJECTS. An initiative relating to Boise City development of library facilities by: prohibiting Boise City from appropriating or spending funds, or incurring debt for any aspect of a city library facility reasonably expected to exceed \$25,000,000.00 in total without prior voter approval of the qualified electors; requiring that Boise City provide in such election notice the "plan and design," which shall include the cost, financing method, location, design, and size of the proposed Boise library facility; providing that approval of a proposed library facility occurs by a majority vote in favor of the project at an election held on an official election date; defining the term "expenses" as actual monetary payments, in kind assistance, the value of employee time, the value of land exchanges, direct or indirect payments to third parties and any other consideration which in any way promotes or enhances the development of a Boise library facility; defining the term "major library project" as any library project reasonably expected to exceed \$25,000,000.00 in total costs and/or expenses; and defining the term "plan and design" as a proposal that includes any element of the cost, financing method, location, design, and size of a Boise City library facility."

A Yes vote meant: "The City of Boise could not undertake any aspect of a library project with expected costs of \$25,000,000 or more without first obtaining approval by a majority of Boise voters in a future election."

A No vote meant: "Current law would not change. The City of Boise could undertake any aspect of a library project without first obtaining voter approval."

City Code Chapter 27 Library Projects

Adopted July 28, 2020

1-27-1: PURPOSE:

The people of the City Boise find that it is in the interest of the City of Boise and its residents to work together in pursuing major projects and that by having a public vote on major library projects there will be more public involvement, more public support, and a better result. (Ord. 58-19, 12-10-2019; amd. Ord. 22-20, 7-28-2020)

1-27-2: ELECTION APPROVAL REQUIRED:

The City of Boise shall not incur expenses as defined herein, for the construction or any additional aspect of any major library project unless the City Council of Boise has received the approval of the qualified electors of the City of Boise at a duly conducted election. (Ord. 58-19, 12-10-2019; amd. Ord. 22-20, 7-28-2020)

1-27-3: DISCLOSURE OF PLAN AND DESIGN PROPOSAL:

The proposed schematic design and funding strategy for any major library project shall be disclosed in the notice of election. (Ord. 58-19, 12-10-2019; amd. Ord. 22-20, 7-28-2020)

1-27-4: APPROVAL:

Approval of a major library project occurs when the majority of votes cast are cast in favor thereof at an election held on an official election date designated by State law. (Ord. 58-19, 12-10-2019; amd. Ord. 22-20, 7-28-2020)

1-27-5: DEFINITIONS:

Terms used in this section are defined as follows:

EXPENSES: Actual monetary payments, in-kind assistance, the value of land exchanges, direct or indirect payments to third parties, and any other consideration which promotes or enhances the development of a major library project. Expenses shall not include any City incurred costs for the development of a schematic design, as defined herein.

FUNDING STRATEGY: The planned method of any financing mechanisms that will be utilized to fund any major library project.

MAJOR LIBRARY PROJECT: Any library project reasonably expected to require expenses totaling not less than twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000).

SCHEMATIC DESIGN: The preparation of studies to ascertain the requirement of the project, consisting of drawings and other documents illustrating the scale and relationship of the project components for approval by the City. The SCHEMATIC DESIGN includes the architect's preliminary estimate of construction costs. (Ord. 58-19, 12-10-2019; amd. Ord. 22-20, 7-28-2020)

PROJECT TIMING SCENARIOS

Funding is essential for developing specific implementation timelines. Because funding strategies and availability have not yet been confirmed for the recommended projects, implementation timelines have not yet been developed.

In addition to funding availability, other considerations for future development of the sequence and timing of these projects may include:

- Mitigating escalation. Local, regional, and national construction markets have seen significant escalation in recent years, and sources suggest additional escalation ahead. It is doubtful that these capital projects will ever be less expensive than they are today. The sooner the city can move projects forward, the lower the impact that future escalation will likely have.
- Addressing community needs. Prioritizing replacement of the leased Collister and Hillcrest library spaces
 with expanded branches will significantly boost community access and service. They also can support
 new services and spaces that aren't provided in Boise's current library facilities.
- Maintenance needs. For Cole & Ustick and Bown Crossing, it may be logical to schedule service renovations to coincide with moderate to major life cycle maintenance improvements that may interrupt library service (as applicable), such as roof replacement, interior finish replacement, mechanical system upgrades, etc.
- Managing operating expenditures. Larger libraries typically require more operating resources than smaller branches. While larger Hillcrest and Collister libraries will eventually need more staff, collections, technology, etc. than the current small branches, the City may be able to phase projects so that they can be moved and shared until the entire capital program is complete. (For example, if a service remodel of Cole & Ustick is scheduled to begin just after the new Hillcrest opens, it may be possible to temporarily move Cole & Ustick's staff, collections, etc. to the new Hillcrest thus delaying the need to hire staff and build up the opening day collection.)
- Avoiding simultaneous closures. Taking a library offline temporarily during construction will likely increase
 use and demand at the other BPL (and Lynx) locations. Coordinating library capital projects to manage
 shifting usage levels and ensure sufficient available service capacity will help customers and staff through
 the inevitable but ultimately rewarding disruptions.
- City and BPL management capacity. BPL, in collaboration with the Boise Public Works Department team, should consider the feasibility of managing multiple design and construction projects at the same time.
- Voter approval. In the November 2019 election, Boise voters passed Proposition 1: Boise Voter Approval Requirement for Library Development Initiative which requires "...voter approval of the cost, financing, location, design, and size of certain Boise City library facility projects." For projects recommended in this plan that may be subject to this requirement, project timing-related factors include that the package put before the voters is required to include some level of design, and that the vote must be held on "an official election date."


Other considerations include community support, timing and availability of funding, and taking advantage of well-aligned opportunities as they arise.

SEQUENCING SCENARIO A* Minimize effects





Introduction

This memorandum is a supplement to the main report document for the Facilities Master Plan (FMP) for Boise Public Library (BPL), which proposes improvement projects for library facilities in Boise over a 10-year timeframe.

This memorandum describes the budgeting methodology and "order of magnitude" capital budgets for the FMP-recommended projects. The budgets in this memo are <u>in current dollars</u>, without escalation. Note that these budgets are <u>not a prediction or guarantee</u> of the cost of any project. The City of Boise and BPL should review and update these budgets regularly to reflect changes in project scope, design refinements, anticipated construction timing, changing market conditions, and other variables.

METHODOLOGY

The projects recommended in the FMP are aspirational and have not yet undergone any level of design. As such, capital budgets for the recommended projects are based on high-level assumptions about project scope, scale, and quality.

Construction cost inputs were provided by Portland, Oregon-based ACC Cost Consultants (https://archcost.com/) based on recent comparable projects in the region including libraries and other high-quality civic buildings. The inputs include per-square-foot costs and allowances that – when combined with general building and site area assumptions – form a budget range for construction. All cost inputs assume that the work is competitively bid and built with labor at local prevailing wage.

Site and building construction costs are only part of the overall cost of each capital project. The capital budgets developed for the FMP-recommended projects strive to be as inclusive as reasonably possible, considering the whole cost of each project. In addition to anticipated hard costs, the budgets also include allowances for fixtures, furnishings, and equipment, as well as building technology and signage. Budgets include allowances for owner costs such as design/engineering fees, permitting, etc.

Design, construction, soft cost, and project contingencies are included in these preliminary budgets to account for some of the "unknowns" of the proposed projects, such as market changes, unforeseen conditions, and new opportunities. The capital budgets proposed in this memo are not a prediction or guarantee of low bid or actual cost.

Exclusions

The budgets <u>exclude</u> land acquisition costs (or land sale proceeds) that may be associated with relocations; temporary library facilities during construction; targeting higher levels of sustainable design than required by applicable codes and standards; registration and certification costs for opt-in programs such as LEED and WELL; hazardous materials assessment and abatement; and other associated and unknown costs. As projects are further defined and designed, the City and BPL will be able to refine the budgets to include or exclude relevant elements as appropriate.

The capital budgets also <u>exclude</u> library operational costs and expenses such as added staff, collection development, public and staff technology, automated materials handling systems and other specialty equipment, etc.

PRELIMINARY CAPITAL PROJECT BUDGETS

All recommended capital budgets below are in Q2 2025 dollars without future escalation. Once the timeline for each project is confirmed, escalation should be applied – typically to the projected midpoint of construction.

New 25,000-30,000 Square Foot Branches – \$20 to \$25 Million Each¹

The FMP recommends that all new branches in Boise should be at least 25,000 square feet in order to provide the breadth, depth, and diversity of spaces and resources to serve community needs. Both Hillcrest and Collister branches are recommended for redevelopment at 25,000 square feet or larger. Any additional branches that the City may elect to build should be at least this size as well.

Construction costs for new branch facilities assume:

- all-new construction on uncomplicated sites;
- civic-quality structures with high-performance envelopes, efficient building systems, and durable materials;
- attractive architecture with dynamic and flexible interior spaces that can adapt over time to accommodate changing needs and services; and
- surface parking. (More intensive parking solutions such as multi-level garages and under-building parking will increase the cost of the project.)

In addition to options for all-new construction, the City can also explore and evaluate opportunities to acquire existing buildings that can be transformed into libraries. Whether this can offer the City any savings cannot be determined before the characteristics and conditions of a candidate site are known. Until that time, it is recommended that the City carry the budget for all-new construction.

Branch Updates – \$1.5 to 1.75 Million Each²

Both the Bown Crossing and Cole + Ustick branches will be due for their first life-cycle refresh and update during the next 10 years. In addition to addressing life-cycle maintenance needs of the buildings and systems (such as roof replacement, mechanical equipment upgrades, etc.), the suggested construction budgets for these projects are intended to provide selected opportunities to update the interior spaces to reflect new community priorities and evolving library services. The community should be involved in the process of confirming and prioritizing these updates for each branch.

Downtown Library; BPL Operations

While the FMP finds that the current Downtown Library building is inadequate to support library needs in Boise, a major project to expand or replace it is not considered a priority within the next 10 years. Over the next decade the City should continue to address maintenance needs, keep interior spaces and furnishings fresh and welcoming, and make other strategic updates to services and operations at the Downtown Library. A renovation of the first floor is currently underway; updates of upper floors can be considered over time as well.

Some of BPL's operational divisions are significantly constrained in their current space in the Downtown Library. Within the next 10 years, the City can look for opportunities to move these functions to expanded space in a different location – which need not necessarily be centrally-located or highly visible as these functions are not public-facing. Relocating these functions to better space can not only improve their efficiency and effectiveness in supporting library service throughout Boise, but also free up space in the Downtown Library for public use.

Additional focused study will be needed to determine the appropriate amount of space for BPL operations and the scope of improvements for upper floors in the Downtown Library over the next 10 years. The City can develop appropriate associated budgets at that time as well.

UPDATING BUDGETS OVER TIME

The City and BPL are strongly encouraged to revisit these preliminary capital budgets regularly and to update them as needed to reflect changing conditions and opportunities. For example, some of the FMP-recommended projects may change and evolve over time, such as to reflect community input and priorities during the next phases of planning and design. New and different opportunities may also arise beyond what is anticipated in this FMP – for example, partnering with other City department(s) on a new shared facility, or acquiring a great building for adaptive reuse that happens to be a little bit larger than 30,000 square feet.

Market escalation is also important to track. Historically construction costs in the US in the 20th century doubled roughly every 20 to 25 years or so, on average (or about 3% per year). Since the turn of the 21st century, the rate of escalation has been somewhat higher than the historical average. M.A. Mortenson's Construction Cost Index³ for selected cities suggests that costs increased approximately 33% in Portland, Oregon over just the past five years. Mortensen also shows that construction costs in Seattle have increased by 43% since 2020 – and have more than doubled over the past 15 years.

Construction costs have always been affected by a wide variety of factors that are mostly beyond our clients' control – such as labor costs, availability of materials and equipment, and the regional availability and capacity of contractors and subcontractors to do the work, to name a few. Within the past six months, the promise of tariffs has also brought new uncertainty and volatility to the construction market.

Market conditions and escalation over the next few years will likely continue to be difficult to forecast. ACC Cost Consultants recommends budgeting for at least the historical average of 3% annual escalation – which would increase the budgets in this memo by nearly 16% by 2030 and almost 35% by 2035.

Strategies for periodically updating these preliminary capital budgets include making adjustments based on an index such as that published by *Engineering News-Record* and/or commissioning an architectural team with a cost consultant.


